## Program overview

IGNOU's Master of Arts in Sociology is offered under the programme code **MSO** through the School of Social Sciences, with a minimum duration of 2 years and a maximum duration of 4 years.[cite:592][cite:597] The programme is designed to build advanced understanding of sociological theories, research methods, development studies, and sociology in the Indian context.[cite:592]

## Second-year syllabus

In the second year, students generally choose 32 credits from the available electives and interdisciplinary papers. ## Subject-wise understanding

### MSO-001: Sociological Theories and Concepts

This paper is the backbone of the programme because it introduces the major theoretical traditions that shape sociological analysis. Students typically engage with conceptual tools used to understand society, institutions, power, culture, and change.[cite:592][cite:593]

### MSO-002: Research Methodologies and Methods

This paper is crucial for students who want academic depth and research readiness. It helps learners understand how sociological evidence is generated, interpreted, and presented using both qualitative and quantitative methods.[cite:592][cite:593]

## MSO-003: Sociology of Development

This course examines development not just as economic growth but as a social and political process. It is especially relevant for students preparing for teaching, public policy, rural development, social sector work, and research roles.[cite:592][cite:593]

## MSO-004: Sociology in India

This paper grounds sociology in the Indian setting through themes such as caste, village studies, social stratification, and institutional change. It is one of the most important papers for competitive exam preparation and Indian social thought.[cite:592][cite:593]

## Recommended second-year combinations

Different students can choose different second-year combinations depending on their goals. Since the programme offers multiple elective and interdisciplinary options, a sensible strategy is to group papers by career interest.[cite:594][cite:596][cite:600]

## MSO vs MASO in 2026

A point of confusion for 2026 students is the appearance of the newer MASO structure in some sources. The MASO page shows a semester-style framework with papers such as MSO-101, MSO-102, MSO-103, and newer electives, while the older MSO page still displays the 8-credit paper format familiar to earlier batches.[cite:595][cite:598]

This means students should verify their exact admission batch and programme code before downloading study material or making a year-wise study plan. If the admission offer, ID card, or regional centre records show MSO, the course structure in this report remains the relevant reference; if the university allots MASO, the semester-based structure on the newer IGNOU page should be followed instead.[cite:592][cite:595][cite:598]

## Study planning tips

Students usually find the first year more theory-intensive and concept-heavy, while the second year becomes more interest-driven because of elective choice.
